Course Title: Street Law

Course Description: Street Law is a semester long social studies elective that serves as an introductory

course to law and legal systems in the United States. Units will include Introduction to Law; Constitutional Law; Criminal Law, and the Criminal Justice Process; and Civil Law (Torts, Contracts, Family Law, and Individual Rights). Students will touch on broad and specific legal topics to give them a better understanding of law and how it affects real life. Students will use case studies, individual research, group

discussion/debate, guest speakers, and mock trials throughout the course.
