Elementary

EES:

OCTOBER

As part of our PBIS program, we have implemented a NOBLE Platter award that is given out each day in each (K-2) and (3-5) lunch to the class that is following the NOBLE cafeteria expectations. The winning class gets to take the blue tray back to their room for the day to display in their door window. Cafeteria expectations are reviewed on a regular basis. The winning class each month receives a popcorn party! In October, Mrs. Head's 5th grade and Miss Chase's 1st grade class earned that honor. One of our PBIS goals this year is to focus on improving cafeteria behavior. We have definitely seen improvement, and the kids love it!

EES has completed a winter coat drive helping students in need.

Our backpack food program is up and running. This program assists over 40 families.

SAES:

The month of October always brings fun and exciting new elements to elementary classrooms. In preparation for the Halloween holiday, 1st grade students in Mrs. Chapman's classroom created skeletons using a variety of pastas as the culminating activity for their CKLA "Human Body Unit". Students in Mrs. Jones's 1st grade classroom continue to enjoy and learn new uses for their "Classroom Wizard", the Merlyn Origin device, which allows ongoing interactive access to the Clear Touch board from anywhere in the classroom. The "Sewing and Crafts Class" at SAMHS partnered with SAES School Counselor Emyle Sherrard to bring hand painted character-themed pumpkins, as voted on by each class, to every classroom at SAES in preparation for their Halloween festivities. Halloween brought a wonderful day of fun-filled activities, including a Halloween-themed Science Magician assembly provided by our incredibly supportive SAES PTO. Students then enjoyed the traditional outdoor Halloween parade followed by the time-honored tradition of walking the halls on

the Sheffield Area Middle High School side of the campus. SAES thanks PTO for their generous support including classroom snacks on holidays, student assemblies/activities, and most especially, their ongoing volunteer presence that allows for seamless execution of all events.

November kicked off with a focus on "Veteran's Day." Students in Mrs. Hornstrom's 5th grade class took time out of their day to honor the holiday by placing phone calls to 14 Veteran families to thank them for their service. On Friday, November 9th, SAES celebrated their monthly PBIS (Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports) assembly with a special "Hometown Heroes" theme. Various "heroes" from the Sheffield community were invited to attend the assembly and share their real-life service experiences (examples include fire service, EMS responders, medical/nursing staff members, community volunteers, and others) with students and staff. The Hometown Heroes awarded the P.R.I.D.E. brag tags and letters earned by SAES students. Students sang the SAES P.R.I.D.E. song and all students were then given an opportunity to tour a real fire truck and learn about equipment and related responses to emergency situations. SAES continues to thank the amazing Sheffield community for their ongoing support and all that they do for our students, staff, and school each and every day.

WAEC:

Building/General:

- Halloween week at WAEC has been heralded as one of the best ones yet! The PTO put on a
 Fall Festival ("Trail of Treats") that included a very well attended and supported Scholastic
 Book Fair. On Halloween, WAEC students, teachers, and staff were able to parade through
 the Warren County Career Center and had many volunteers come to support classroom
 parties and the parade.
 - The WCCC Protective Services students assisted in the Halloween parade by directing traffic, ensuring student safety, and communicating with building administration.
- WAEC had a high participation rate for parents at the WAEC Parent/Teacher Conferences on 11.11.2024 through a variety of platforms (in-person, emailing, phone calls, and Rooms).
- WAEC PTO continues to be highly supportive of the school by serving lunch for teachers on Parent/Teacher Conference Day.
- Becky Woldt, an involved parent and PTO member, created a "Trail Mystery Tour" for students which contained educational information, stations, and a mystery to solve on the nature trail behind the building. It was highly engaging and allowed students to learn with a hands-on approach.
- Megan Loomis is back with us as a building paraprofessional, and we are THRILLED to have her back Thank you!!!
- Mr. Bedow has been selected to participate in a year-long PaTTAN cohort for structured literacy. At the initial full-day training in Harrisburg (PaTTAN Central), it is evident that due to the implementation of ECRI, WCSD is ahead of the game in meeting the criteria established in Senate Bill SB801.

- Mr. Smith participated in mock interviews at Pitt-Bradford for students in their education programming looking to become teachers.
- Mrs. Darr has implemented an "Adopt A Bus" program that is focused on improving student behavior on district transportation.

Kindergarten:

- All Kindergarten teachers are fully implementing Enhanced Core Reading Instruction (ECRI) through the Success for PA Early Learners (SPEL) grant, and we are already noticed major gains in student reading skills!
 - Some of our Kindergarten students are reading and writing full sentences already.
 This is way ahead of normal schedule!
- Disruptive Behaviors are slowing down significantly because students are getting the support they need to support their emotional/behavioral needs.
- The Early Childhood program at WCCC has been sending Kindergarten students a craft to complete every month.

First Grade:

• First grade students recently received a shipment of handmade wooden toys for students in need.

Second Grade:

- Mrs. Angela Blair and Mrs. Barb Pitner are both substitute teachers who are covering in second and third grades, and they are doing a wonderful job.
- Mr. Scalise has welcomed an intern to his classroom to observe and participate in his class once a week.

Third Grade:

- The new science curriculum is very well received by teachers and students alike.
- We are seeing a sharp increase in student math fact fluency mastery especially with multiplication and division.

Fourth Grade:

- 60 second sweeps
 - This is a strategy to avoid loss of instructional time due to classroom interruptions (phone calls, classroom visits by administrators, etc.). This was teacher-led, headed by Mrs. Curren, the fourth-grade team leader, and being implemented building-wide at all grade levels.
- Our fourth-grade team has been collaborating with the 5th grade team at Beaty to identify areas of strength and areas of need for student academic and functional performance to best support student transition to middle school. This is something that is new this year.

Youngsville Elementary School created a video for How Cool is our School: See the video in this link: https://wcsdpaorg-


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5th Grade Teacher Janet Peters was awarded a grant for \$150.00 through PARS:

VA - Inside:

The Warren County School District Virtual Academy continues to add students every week. Currently there 126 students with full time status, 29 students who are part time in their home school and part time virtual, 34 students who are part time at the Warren Conty Career Center and taking the rest of their courses virtually, and 238 who are taking enrichment courses.

VA - Outside:

This month has marked several key achievements for Virtual Academy Services, which continues to support 17 school districts statewide in delivering high-quality virtual education.

- **First Marking Period Completion**: We successfully wrapped up the first marking period, pulling grades for each district. This milestone highlights our commitment to keeping each district informed and updated on student progress.
- Enhanced Reporting Process: We are currently updating our course attendance and
 grading reports for all partner districts. This new report will streamline how districts monitor
 course engagement and student progress, offering a more efficient way to identify and
 address any attendance concerns, including potential truancy. This update will be an
 invaluable tool for districts in supporting students who may need additional guidance or
 intervention.
- On-Site Visits in Erie County: I recently had the opportunity to visit seven Erie County schools, meeting face-to-face with local education leaders. The in-person interactions strengthened our partnerships and allowed us to work collaboratively to address their unique needs.
- Marketing and Course Materials: To support our districts in student recruitment and
 retention, we delivered customized marketing sheets branded with each district's specific
 program information. These materials will aid districts in reaching out to families, including
 those considering alternative cyber options, by highlighting the extensive course offerings
 available through our program.

These initiatives underscore our dedication to continuous improvement and collaboration with our districts, helping us better serve students and families across Pennsylvania.

Letford, M.ED focused on creative thinking and encouraged teachers to change their perspective for the better to make better connections with students. The second Keynote speaker was Julie F. stories with students she has worked with in her career. The teachers also learned new activities and strategies to put in place in their classes now, as well as ideas to share with other educators.

The YMHS winter sports teams have a great number of participants for winter sports. In total, 85 students signed up to participate in winter sports at YMHS.
