9175 Family Life/Sex Education

In recognition of the fact that sexuality is fundamental to all life, and is of primary importance in nature, in society, and in the life of every individual; and in recognition of the fact that the essence of education is the acquisition of knowledge related to those areas that are important in society and in the lives of individuals, the Board accepts the responsibility to provide information concerning sexuality as part of the educational opportunities available to students.

The Board further recognizes that the family has the primary responsibility for the education of children in the area of human sexuality. Although the public schools have a responsibility to provide information concerning sexuality, it is the family that provides the specific value system through which students translate knowledge into decisions and actions.

In the District, the guidelines for instruction relating to human sexual behavior are that abstinence from sexual activity is the only completely reliable means of preventing conception. and that abstinence from sexual activity is the only completely reliable means of preventing sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS. Programs discussing transmission through sexual activity shall stress that abstinence from sexual activity is the only completely reliable means of presenting sexual transmission.

9325 Homebound Education

 The Board may provide, pursuant to rules and regulations of the State Board of Education, tutorial instruction to students confined to home or hospital for physical disability, illness, or injury, or when such confinement is recommended for psychological or psychiatric reasons. Applications for tutorial services shall be recommended by a physician and approved by the Superintendent or his/her designee. The program of instruction shall be limited to a maximum of five hours per week. The District reserves the right to withhold individual instruction when the instructor's presence in the place of a student's confinement presents a hazard to the health or safety of the instructor, or when a parent or other responsible adult is not present in the home during the hours of instruction.

9330 Private Tutoring

 In accordance with the School Code, the District shall permit a parent, guardian, or legal custodian to retain a properly qualified tutor for the purpose of conducting an educational program in the home. Tutoring programs shall be conducted at the expense of the parent. A private tutor must meet minimal qualifications as established by the Home Education Program Act. The Superintendent or his/her designee shall establish procedures to facilitate the transition of students between the public school system and private tutoring programs. The Superintendent or his/her designee shall establish procedures to determine which programs in the public school system will be made available to students in private tutoring programs.

9500 INSTRUCTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

9525 **Exemption From Instruction**

> Students may be excused from specific instruction which conflicts with their religious beliefs, or based upon other reasonable concerns.

The rights granted by this policy are granted to parents of students enrolled in this District where the students are under the age of eighteen (18) and to the students themselves when the student is eighteen (18) or over.

As used in this policy, the phrase "specific instruction" means identifiable elements of instruction by the teacher. It does not include learning outcomes.

The request to be excused from specific instruction must be made in writing and must detail the specific instruction with respect to which the student is to be excused.

The Superintendent or his/her designee may develop procedures for implementing this policy.

9540 Excusing Students from the State Assessment/District Assessment

The District shall excuse any student from the state/District assessment upon satisfaction of and subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Parent or guardian may review the state assessment/ District assessment in the school district two weeks prior to their administration during convenient hours for parents or guardians.
- 2. The request must be made in writing two (2) days prior to the administration of the assessment.
- 3. The written request to be excused shall be sent/delivered to the building principal. One copy shall be retained in the student's permanent record.
- 4. The written request must include a statement that taking the assessment is objectionable for religious reasons.
- 5. The building principal shall determine where the student shall report during the time the assessment is administered.

It shall be the responsibility of the Superintendent or his/her designee to develop additional procedures for implementing this policy.

9750 Promotion and Retention

It shall be the general policy of the District to assist and encourage each student to progress in a continuous growth pattern of academic achievement in harmony with his/her normal social and emotional development.

Most students will require the normal allotted time to progress through the nine year kindergarten/middle curriculum.

In arriving at the decision for either acceleration or retention of students, there should be a combined view of the teachers, principal, and others. For children in jeopardy of retention, a minimum of three (3) school conferences between such interested persons shall occur to reach a combined view. The first conference must occur before the end of the second full week in March and parents/ guardians of children in jeopardy will be invited to those conferences. Results obtained from various tests and class work assignments will be important factors in the decision. It will be the building principal's responsibility to make the final determination.

Concurrent with a recommendation to retain, a plan to insure proper remediation during the next school year is to be developed by teachers, administrators, counselors and the parents of the involved student.

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9900 MISCELLANEOUS INSTRUCTIONAL POLICIES

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9905 Copyright

On January 1, 1978, Public Law 94-533, the new Copyright Law, went into effect in the United States. It is the intent of the District Directors to adhere to the provisions of this law. The Board recognizes that violations of copyright law contribute to higher costs and/or lessen incentives for the development of good instructional materials. Though there continues to be controversy regarding interpretation of copyright law, this policy represents a sincere effort to operate legally and to maintain the highest possible ethical standard in the District's use of copyrighted materials for administrative and instructional purposes.

While the District encourages its staff to enrich learning programs by making proper use of instructional materials, it is the responsibility of District personnel to abide by the District's copying procedures and obey the requirements of the law. Under no circumstances shall it be necessary for employees of the District to violate copyright requirements in order to perform their duties properly. The Board does not sanction or condone illegal duplication in any form and any employee violating the school district's copyright position does so at his/her own risk and assumes all liability and responsibilities.

In an effort to discourage violation of the copyright law and to prevent such illegal activities from occurring in facilities utilizing equipment under the Board's control, the following policy shall be applied:

1. The Superintendent or his/her designee, working through the appropriate administrators, has the responsibility of informing district employees that the copyright law, subsequent Congressional amendment, "fair use" clarified by case law, and the district policy and procedures herein outlined, shall guide employee use of copyrighted material. Employees shall also be informed that violation of copyright is a felony and that the law allows a court to hold individuals personally responsible for infringing the law. Employees shall inform students that violation of copyright is a felony and that the law allows a court to hold individuals personally responsible for infringing the law.

- 2. Administrators with responsibility for equipment such as photocopy machines, audio and video tape recorders, microcomputers, and any other technology capable of reproducing copyrighted material shall take responsible steps to inform staff of the appropriate and legal application of the equipment's use. When practical, appropriate copyright notices shall be placed on or near all district equipment capable of making copies.
- 3. Information about copyright law and policies shall be distributed to employees through a printed publication which addresses all issues of copyright law. Ignorance of the law is no excuse for violation.
- 4. No District hardware, software or facilities may be used to violate copyright laws, regulations, or guidelines.
- 5. Legal or insurance protection and indemnification shall not be extended to employees who willfully violate copyright law and policies.
- 6. Appropriate copyright records, including but not necessarily limited to site licenses and notices of rights expiration, shall be developed and retained by District staff designated by the Superintendent or his/her designee.
- 7. Illegal copies of District owned copyrighted programs may not be duplicated or used on school equipment nor can copies of District or school licensed programs be duplicated on employee or student owned equipment.
- 8. Willful infringement of the law by an employee or student may result in disciplinary action.

9940 Parents' Curriculum Access Policy

> All curriculum documents, adopted material, and assessment techniques of the District are public documents to which parents shall have access for review. The planned courses taught in each building shall be on file in that building. Parents may contact the building administrator to make arrangements to review the same. All planned courses for the district shall be on file at the central office where they may be reviewed upon request. A listing of all District planned courses and a description of each shall also be on file in each building.

All proposed materials for adoption will be available to the public for review 30 days prior to Board approval. These materials will be available at Central Office. Parents have the option of expressing their opinion in writing to the Superintendent or his/her designee. The District's materials will then be presented for Board approval.
