Course Grading

Besides engaging students in challenging curriculum, the course guides students to reflect on their learning and evaluate their progress through a variety of assessments. Assessments can be in the form of practice lessons, multiple choice questions, writing assignments, projects, research papers, oral assessments, and discussions. This course will use the state-approved grading scale. Each course contains a mandatory final exam or culminating project that will be weighted at 20% of the student's overall grade.***

***Proctored exams can be requested by FLVS at any time and for any reason in an effort to ensure academic integrity. When taking the exam to assess a student's integrity, the student must pass the exam with at least a 59.5% in order to earn credit for the course.

Communication Policy

Besides engaging students in challenging curriculum, FLVS guides students to reflect on their learning and to evaluate their progress through a variety of assessments. Assessments can be in the form of practice work files with self-checks, exams, speaking, listening, and writing assignments (short research essays in English and French, short paragraphs in French) projects, and discussion-based assessments. Instructors evaluate progress

and provide interventions through the variety of assessments built into a course, as well as through contact with the student in other venues.
