Positive Happenings: Virtual Academy Services Update

This month, Virtual Academy Services (VAS) has been focused on exploring innovative tools and strategies to enhance virtual instruction and support both teachers and students.

- Exploring AI and New Tools for Instruction: We have been actively researching and testing AI-driven tools within our Learning Management System (LMS) to provide additional support for teachers and improve student learning experiences. As AI continues to develop, we anticipate an increase in tools that can streamline instruction, provide real-time feedback, and enhance engagement in a virtual setting.
- **Professional Development at PETE&C**: Administration attended the PETE&C conference to gain deeper insight into AI in education and best practices for online learning. This opportunity allowed us to connect with industry experts, explore cutting-edge technologies, and bring back valuable resources to share with staff.
- **February 17th Professional Development**: Insights from PETE&C were shared with our educators during the recent PD day, providing them with an opportunity to explore potential new instructional supports. Some key tools that were discussed:
 - ALEE: A novel-based learning platform that offers comprehensive novel units, which could be embedded within our existing English curriculum.
 - Streamable Learning: A virtual field trip platform that allows students to experience real-world learning from their screens, broadening their educational experiences.
 - ClickView: A content resource that provides engaging, high-quality 3–7 minute videos aligned with subject areas and standards, helping teachers build out curriculum with engaging instructional content.

As we continue to innovate, these tools have the potential to enhance virtual learning by making instruction more interactive, engaging, and personalized. The positive engagement from our teachers and districts reinforces the importance of exploring new ways to support student success in an evolving educational landscape.

YMHS:


Youngsville Middle/High School honored Caitlyn Pikna as the high school student of the month for January and both Ethyn Higley and Rylee Rectenwald for middle school.
