
WAEC:

WAEC students had a great time at the K'Nex competition at the IU5 in Edinboro! WAEC teams were awarded two of the four awards presented at the competition. Second place was awarded to Team 3: Lincoln Betts, Joel Banuelos, Alex Haight and Camden Woods for their project called "Community Bots." Their design was a self-driving, rentable device that would clean up trash, collect and shred leaves, and mow and water lawns. The Most Creative Award was presented to Team 1: Aria Carlson, Bo Winkels, Draedon Gnage, and Grayson Zapel for their project called "Wheelchair Scooter." Their scooter would provide more accessibility for wheelchairs to be transported around in uneven city environments and rented for use from various points throughout the urban settings. On April 1st, SAES was well represented at the STEM design competition held in Edinboro, PA:

Knex STEM Design Competition

Sheffield Elementary school was well represented at the STEM Design Competition held in Edinboro on April 1, 2025. For this year's challenge, students were asked to focus on Industry, Innovation, and Infrastructure by designing a prototype that addressed a real-world problem related to infrastructure, transportation, or urban development.



Blake Weiser, Tristan Lord and Carson Lord made up team "Robot Ready" and their design was intended to make filling potholes more efficient by using a robot that would travel along city roads and as soon as the robot detected a pothole, it would immediately fill it.

Team PCCP (Project Chemical Clean-Up Pennsylvania) members Madilynn Leichtenberger, Jaxon Wotorson, Elliot Blymiller, and Kaydi Markey took on the problem of microplastics in drinking water. They designed a filtration system that could float on a city's water treatment system and remove microplastics so that the drinking water wasn't contaminated.

Their design earned them a 1st place finish in the regional competition, and a spot in the state competition which is held at the Farm Show Complex in Harrisburg on May 9th!

VA – Outside:

This month, Virtual Academy Services (VAS) has been focused on preparation, collaboration, and planning ahead to ensure strong support for students, districts, and staff as we head into the testing season and next school year.

- **PSSA Preparation & PVAAS Alignment**: We are working closely with all of our partner districts to prepare students for the upcoming PSSA assessments. This includes ensuring every student is accurately loaded into the system for PVAAS reporting. We've been collaborating with districts to determine each student's instructional time within VAS versus their home district—a critical step in maintaining accurate data and accountability.
- Vendor Collaboration for Continued Improvement: We've also been meeting with all of our current vendors to review course offerings and instructional supports. These conversations help us identify areas for growth, ensure content alignment with standards, and explore additional tools that can support both students and teachers more effectively in a virtual setting.
- **Planning Ahead for 2025–2026**: In addition to supporting this year's instruction and testing, we are in the process of finalizing contracts for next year's services. These efforts ensure that we're well-prepared to continue offering high-quality virtual instruction and maintain strong partnerships with all 17 of our participating districts.

Cupcake Cabana Takes the win at Warren Area High Schools 4th Annual Food Truck Faceoff

Warren's 4th Annual Food Truck Faceoff served up creativity, flavor, and flair—culminating in a sweet victory for Cupcake Cabana, who took top honors in this year's competition.

As the grand finale of a semester-long Family and Consumer Science course, students in Mrs. Lewann Alexander's class transformed the cafeteria into a culinary showcase. Each student team designed and built their own food truck concept, complete with a them ed menu and decorated truck facade. Their final challenge? Pitch their concept and dish to a panel of local food connoisseurs. "This is a culminating project that allows students to demonstrate what they've learned in a creative and fun way," said Mrs. Alexander. "They start with an idea, build on it, and end up with something they're really proud of."

Twenty-one teams participated, each offering one signature dish from their carefully curated menus. Featured items ranged from spinach chicken wraps, pasta to iced coffees, loaded baked potatoes, and passion fruit cupcakes. Some teams even paired drinks or added ambiance with music and lights, making their presentations as vibrant as their flavors.

Judges Marcy Stanton, Scott Alexander, Jessica Rex, and Kellie Goldthwaite evaluated each truck using a rubric that equally weighed theme, design, creativity, effort, presentation, visual appeal, and—of course—taste.

"The level of effort was truly impressive," one judge noted. "These students put so much thought into the details, and the results were outstanding."

In a closely scored competition, the top four trucks emerged:

1st Place: Cupcake Cabana-created by Noel Alexander, Maddie Nelson, Trentin Anthony, and Ava Nelson

2nd Place: Fresh Finds

3rd Place: Malasada Mobile

4th Place: Spud Studs

WCCC:

The FBLA Network design team of Jesse Horning and TJ McAuley are most recent STATE CHAMPIONS. The two will be competing later this spring/early summer in California.

The WCCC is heavily involved in annual NOCTI testing. Seniors who have been enrolled in a program for at least 2 years take an end of program assessment – NOCTI (except for Machine Technology). The test is broken down into 2 parts – Written and Performance. The performance test is proctored by an outside expert in the field.
