COURSE DESCRIPTION: (Brief – suitable for course descriptions issued to students.)

Sewing and Crafts is an elective course receiving .5 credit. It meets 5 days per week for one semester and is open to 9th through 12th grade students. This course is an introduction to a variety of craft like projects. Some have a seasonal theme while others are appropriate throughout the year. Projects may use a combination of hand and machine sewing skills as well as other crafting techniques. Students are responsible for project materials.

Outline of Content Sequence and Recommended Time (weeks or days):

- A. Introduction to a variety of sewing crafts.
 - a. Impact on the family as a financial resource, as a recreational activity/hobby, or, as a community service project.
 - b. Consumer strategies are discussed as to cost, quality, satisfaction of hand crafts vs. store purchased items.
 - c. Explanation of supplies, tools, space needed to participate in craft.
 - d. Presented information as to care and use of projects created.
 - e. Selected crafts will represent both seasonal and year round use items.
- B. Hands on learning by student.
 - a. Teacher demonstration and supervision is the most extensive tool utilized for learning.
 - b. Examples may be demonstrated on wall posters and individual handouts.
 - c. Commercial and teacher written pattern instructions will be read and explained as needed.
 - d. Students will recognize math concepts and relationships specific to each craft.
 - e. Practice samples worked and evaluated as needed.
 - f. Project completion.
- C. Informational writing about each student's individual project.
 - a. Description of project.
 - b. Comparison of project to a ready made, store bought item.
 - c. Care of project.
 - d. Time and cost and satisfaction with project.
 - e. Grade deserved and justification.
- D. Time will vary depending on individual craft being taught and depth of teaching. Projects may incorporate the following types of craft items:
 - a. Decorative home items- wreaths, wall art, placemats, etc.
 - b. Children's toys- whimsy ball, sock or other dolls, etc.
 - c. Functional projects- pillowcases, totebags, locker organizers, etc.
 - d. Piecework/ appliqué quilting techniques.
 - e. Latchhook.
 - f. Other projects- at teacher's discretion determined by student needs and availability of project materials.
- E. Course content will be adapted as to the backgrounds and needs of the individual student as well as the creative experiences and skills of the teacher/s in each school.
