Due to the many emotional and discipline issues with students as young as kindergarten, I feel it is in the children's best interests to keep class sizes small. Teachers are doing a wonderful job despite the fact that it is very apparent there is very little parenting happening in many families. The general public doesn't have a clue what really happens and what teachers deal with everyday in the classroom.

While I understand community loyalties to their schools, the tax base in the WCSD cannot continue to support numerous schools. The students would benefit from a 2 high school configuration with more acadamic opportunities and the possibility of producing more championship athletic teams. Perhaps those who don't qualify to play on varsity sports could participate in intramurals.

I have a concern about the inability to sell the now-empty elementary schools and wonder if this will also happen in the event of a 2 high school configuration with the remaining high school buildings.

With the school population in continual decline, something has to be done. The graduating class size of all high schools this year is less than graduated from WAHS alone about 12 years ago. We have to consolidate and give all students the chance to take advantage of all courses available in the school system. EX. Warren has many more AP courses available that any ather school in the district. For a student to take advantage of this they have to transfer. Combine the schools and let all students have this chance.

I really do not understand why Warren County feels it must build mega schools that cost millions of dollars when schools can be repaired for less. That aside, classrooms should have no more than 20 children at any age level. Aides should be employed in grades K - 2 and even K - 3, if possible. PLEASE do not build a mega school to house the whole county middle schoolers. Children should not have to be bussed long distances, nor put in buildings with many children. Also, there are cultural and background differences in the areas of Warren County and it is much more comfortable to be in a school with children and families that are similar to your own.

My daughter says she will move if you build a central middle school. Well, I doubt that is possible, but I'll try to pay tuition to put the children in the Christian School for those grades if you do that.

We really feel that several elementary centers are great, but as students get older we would think that blending them together into two larger high schools, such as Youngsville and Warren, would be an asset to the students as they would all have access to many more subjects, including languages, etc. Thank you for considering what we have stated. We really feel this would be much more cost effective and less stressful for the students.

If you honestly look at the children and the impact it will have to consolidate, ask yourself if it's in the best interest of the child. Will they LEARN better? (not test higher...they aren't the same thing.) Will they be better off emotionally, physically, mentally? It's not just about money. It should be about giving our children the best well-rounded education, which includes many things besides the academic portion of their learning.

While I understand that you want to know what people think, I strongly suggest that we look at the research and local successes in grade configurations. Sheffield is 6-12. Their 6th graders show more drug and alcohol use than any other county 6th graders. Is there a cause and effect relationship? YEMS demonstrates to this observer the benefits of middle schoolers staying younger longer during this awkward growth period. There needs to be consideration of transition programs for many 9th graders to high school. They need much more emotional and programming support than they now receive at Warren Area High School for instance. They come from a supportive environment in Beaty and are "thrown to the wolves" at WAHS, with little to no adult support. It is necessary for them in today's world to move on with more educational opportunities, but some are still too immature socially and emotionally to handle the high school environment.

I support consolidation and maximum use of buildings since 90 some % of students already ride buses to school. With students concentrated in fewer buildings, it would be easier to maximize class sizes and courses offered. We may not save money on transportation, but the savings on staff for fewer schools should be significant, and the education available to all students would be equalized.

Ideally, two high schools would be best, but I don't know all the travel criteria to support that at this point. I can see an Eisenhower Area High School, a Warren Area High School and a Youngsville Area High School. A Warren Area High School is a given, but which of the others could be eliminated will have to be justified.

I feel that this district would work much better being set up as an east and west format. Therefore there would be 6 school buildings total. 2 elementary (K-5), 2 middle schools (6-8) and 2 high schools (9-12). Start closing some schools - even if the areas that need to be closed aren't happy - we can't afford this big of a school district anymore. If that means cutting some teachers - I guess that will have to happen. We can't keep all the teachers if we're losing this many students. Also - I think it's time to start trimming some of the management. We only had one superintendent when I was in school in the early 80's and we had more students back then. Now we have 2 and less students - tell me why??????

Meed a strict hair and dress code for both students and teachers. Estblish in house discipline whether the mommies like it or not. Behave by the rules or stay home.

All day kindergarten should be available to all. The students would have additional learning time and it would make families not have to find transportation/daycare for the students for 1/2 a day. Many parents work day time jobs and have no way for the students to get to school or daycare when the times are different than older siblings.

Considering the task before the school board and central office in coming up with a budget that is workable, I feel we need to focus on what the primary purpose of school is all about -- and that is providing our students with the BEST possible education that we can to prepare them for today's ever-changing society.
