HR

Special Education

From beginning of September to mid-March:

- There have been 1240 instances of absences for the special education teacher, aide, and interpreter groups.
- 129 instances were covered internally.
- 104 instances were covered by supervisors. About 9% of all absences were covered by an administrator.

<u>State</u>

HB2022

A bill amending the Public School Code to allow a public school to place a behavioral health representative in a school who may communicate and interact with students to provide social and mental health support assistance.

Specially, my bill will allow a behavioral health representative, stationed in a school under the supervision of a superintendent or other chief administrative officer or their designee, to use evidence-based programs for students that provide:

- crisis management;
- suicide prevention strategies; or
- skills to communicate with peers and adult, manage emotions, setting goals, establishing and maintaining positive relationships, making responsible decisions that support success in school and life;
- a positive school climate.

HB2023

Legislation that will require the PA Department of Education (PDE) to develop a model curriculum to assist school entities in providing behavioral health education.

As we are all well aware, the lack of awareness and identification of behavioral health issues in our schools is not good for Pennsylvania students. Further, many of our students battle mental or behavioral health issues yet lack an environment in which to cope or know who or where to turn to when in need. Due to lack of understanding, much of our society continues to stigmatize behavioral health issues, mainly due to the shortage of educational materials on the topic.

For these reasons, I plan to introduce legislation to address these persistent problems. As the General Assembly has done with other urgent subjects—such as child exploitation awareness—this legislation requires the PA Department of Education, in consultation with at least one organization addressing behavioral health, to develop model behavioral health curriculum to be made available for use by school entities.

Additionally, each school entity may provide four hours of training on behavioral health awareness to professional educators. The four hours of training may be applied to a professional educator's continuing professional education requirements.

HB2024

As we continue assessing the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on our students, the adverse impacts on student mental health has taken an untold toll on all students across the Commonwealth. Providing for student mental health was important pre-pandemic and is paramount as our students navigate school, post-pandemic. To address this critical aspect of education, we need to assure our schools are equipped to handle the mental health needs of our students.

This bill will commission a Mental Health Instruction Study to determine the extent to which schools are currently providing mental health instruction in their curriculum. Data collected from this study will serve as the basis for recommendations for the improvement of mental health instruction in our Commonwealth's schools, including recommending future legislation.

TNTP Releases Resource for Districts on Addressing Teacher Shortages

The guide <u>"Addressing Teacher Shortages: Practical Ideas for the Pandemic and Beyond</u>" was designed to help district leaders understand and respond to the specific staffing challenges they're facing, based on best practices gathered from working with hundreds of school systems over almost 25 years. It's focused on time-tested strategies that will make an immediate impact: ideas for covering absences, filling existing vacancies, and addressing chronic shortages exacerbated by the pandemic in key subject areas and in schools serving historically marginalized communities.

Appropriations (Finally)

This week, Congress passed a FY22 spending package totaling \$1.5 trillion. Notably absent in the bill is an extension for the school nutrition waivers, meaning the current waivers will expire on June 30. Additionally, the IDEA funding level is a cut in comparison to current ARP levels (\$2 b below current ARP levels). Title I is funded at \$17.5 b (\$1 b increase over FY21, but below the \$20 b increase proposed by the President and the House, and the \$16.5 b increase in the Senate). Read our full breakdown of the bill here and see AASA's statement here.

The FY 22 appropriations omnibus bill is set. Recall that an omnibus appropriations bill combines all 12 individual appropriations bills into one giant behemoth, clocking in at just over \$1.5 trillion to fund the entire federal government. The House passed the omnibus Wednesday night. The Senate passed the omnibus Thursday night. The only real controversy in the bill was about including roughly \$15B for the federal government to continue its vaccination and other efforts to combat COVID. Democratic infighting eventually killed this provision. The omnibus also includes nearly \$14B to respond to the Russian invasion of Ukraine. Overall, Democrats will tout some increases to domestic spending/ Republicans will highlight the \$782 billion for defense spending, a 6% increase over current spending levels. But what about education funding? We detail it below, but the high-level summary is that there are modest to incremental increases in various programs, but none of the big plus ups that President Biden called for in his budget request like an additional \$20 billion for Title I and \$2.5 billion for IDEA. Here are some specifics:

- \$17.5 billion for Title I, an increase of \$1 billion above FY21; the largest increase in more than a decade.
- \$14.5 billion for IDEA, an increase of \$448 million above FY21, which includes \$13.3 billion for Part B Grants to States;
- \$831 million for Title III, an increase of \$34 million;
- \$2.2 billion for Title II-A, an increase of \$27 million;
- \$1.3 billion for Title IV-A, an increase of \$60 million;
- Funding for SEL and "whole child" initiatives, including:
- \$11 billion for Head Start, an increase of \$288.7 million.

National News: Understaffing leaves after-school programs with unmet demand

The return to classrooms for the nation's schoolchildren has not meant a return to work for many of their parents who, with workdays that outlast school days, are finding crucial after-school programs in short supply. School-based providers list difficulties hiring and retaining staff as the biggest reasons they have not fully rebounded from pandemic shutdowns and they say they are as frustrated as the parents they are turning away. <u>Associated Press</u>, March 21, 2022
