Youngsville Elementary held two Spirit Days Fridays- Hat Day and PJ Day in January to support two local families who had tragic losses! The response of the Youngsville Elementary student body and staff was tremendous! We were able split \$936.00 between these two local families to offer school support in their recent losses. This is what makes YES should a great place to be!

Our Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) motto at Youngsville Elementary School is SOAR. SOAR stands for Safety, Ownership, and Always Respect. In Physical Education classes this school year,

students are awarded points for each class noting if Safety, Ownership, and Always Respect were exhibited. Students can earn up to three points per class. For "Safety" – students are expected to use equipment correctly and appropriately, wear sneakers, and follow the rules and procedures of the game/activity. For "Ownership" – students are expected to participate fully, try their best, and accept the consequences of their behavior. For "Always Respect" – students are expected to listen while others speak, share equipment, take turns appropriately, and be kind to everyone. Mrs. Darling keeps track of those points for each category for each student. The class that receives the highest percentage score for each grading period, will get an agreed upon incentive chosen by Mrs. Darling and the classroom teacher within the physical education setting. The class will also display "The Golden Sneaker" award within their classroom and be recognized for "SOARing" during Physical Education classes and lessons. Mrs. Renninger's kindergarten class was awarded the Golden Sneaker the first marking period and Ms. Marcu's 4th grade class was awarded the Golden Sneaker for the second marking period. Overall integrating PBIS principles into physical education helps create a supportive and structured learning environment where students can develop not only physical skills but also important social, emotional, and behavioral competencies.
